ANZAC Day



On Monday, 1 May I had the honour and privilege of participating in the College ANZAC Day ceremony. Six cadets, including myself, represented services of both Army and Air Force through a reverent service, with the aim of honouring those who had served or are currently serving in the Australian Defence Force and to acknowledge those who made the ultimate sacrifice to ensure freedom and democracy in our nation. After an acknowledgement of country and a signing of the national anthem, the ode was read. During this time we all took a moment to listen to the words and what they meant to us as people of Australia. After the Ode, the Last Post was played as the six cadets slow marched down the aisles of the assembly and halted in position in front of the

stage. Once in position, a wreath was laid down in respect of the sacrifice that the young men and women made. After this, the cadets saluted and a minute of silence ensued. The salute is the ultimate sign of respect and was used to pay that respect specifically to those who had perished in the name of our sovereign and our freedom during that minute of silence. At the conclusion of the minute silence, the Rouse was played and the cadets dismissed and marched off. It was very humbling to pay respect to those soldiers of freedom and to honour their sacrifice.

My Great Great Uncle Neil MacPerson OAM

This ANZAC Day was a special one for our family. Neil MacPherson, my great grandmother's brother, was one of the last surviving prisoners of war from the Thai-Burma Railway and Japanese coalmines (who recently died aged 96 and 11 months). The following tells some of his story.

In September 1941, he enlisted as a 16 year old and was then sent overseas. They were on their way to Singapore when they were captured. The Japanese decided the prisoners had to work for their food and their project was to build the Burma Railway (a 415km stretch), which he did for two years. They were given "tools" which consisted of knives, forks and tin cans to forge a way through the rock and mountains to build the railway and had to lay the timber sleepers by hand. They endured sickness such as malaria, typhoid and dysentery with no medicines, while enduring daily beatings by their captors. They survived - along with strong resilience - with a cup of rice and watery stew after a day of hard labour. Uncle Neil was then moved to the coalmines in Japan. During this time, my Nana's family had no idea if he was alive or dead.

Once the war ended, he arrived back in Perth on his mother's birthday weighing 35 kilograms.

Post-war, he held no grudge or anger towards the Japanese. Uncle Neil decided no Japanese soldier would shed a tear for him, so the only person who would suffer with his anger would be himself. He decided to forgive the atrocities that were committed against him.

Years later, Uncle Neil went back to Thailand and that's where the real healing began. He was a founder of the Quiet Lion Anzac

Tour and went back every year to help run the ANZAC Tour and dawn service at Hellfire Pass to give the address. Many of our family members have attended with great pride.

He was the co-author of a book, "Hellships and Coalmines", written to raise awareness of POWs, and was awarded the Order of Australia Medal for his efforts.

We are so proud of Uncle Neil's attitude of resilience and forgiveness considering what he went through. He was way ahead of his time and many could take a leaf out of his book. He was booked to return to Thailand this year for the ANZAC dawn service but passed away shortly beforehand. His last ANZAC address was read by his granddaughter. May he now Rest In Peace.

The most valuable lesson I learnt at Lumen Christi was to be myself. If ever I tried to act or behave differently, something would go wrong. As I got older, I started to do more of what I wanted to do, not what others wanted to do. I found happiness in participating in my hobbies, spending time with friends, and learning new things. Code of Conduct

Late in 2016, the Minister for Education released the New Standards for Non-Government School and these were to be operable as soon as possible. It describes the minimum expectation of standards of behavior and is designed to ensure the safety and wellbeing of students.

The College spent some time in 2017 shaping our own Lumen Christi College-specific Code of Conduct and launched it successfully to the College staff late in 2017. The Code applies to all staff, students, parents, visitors and volunteers, so it is important to now spend a part of this year informing parents of the specific details of this code. Each fortnight in the College Newsletter there will be a focus on a particular Conduct Statement with some examples of behaviours that apply to that Conduct Statement.

Key principles

- You acknowledge the inherent vulnerability of the students in your care.
- You recognise that the safety and well-being of students depends upon your vigilance and diligence (all adults).
- The Code does not give you detailed professional advice on specific behaviour. Rather, it describes the minimum requirements expected of you.
- The Guidelines are an illustrative rather than an exhaustive list of the behaviours covered by the Code.
- While mandatory language such as 'must', 'shall' and 'will' is not used throughout the Code, there is a presumption the conduct described is mandatory and therefore, not discretionary.
- Breaches of the Code must be notified to the Principal and it is a breach of the Code not to do so.

There are 12 Conduct Statements that make up this Code of Conduct. Below is Conduct Statement Six.

You maintain and build on the community's trust and confidence in Catholic Colleges and the Church.

Guidelines

1. You respect both the person and capacity of each member of the College Community, treat them with dignity, show respect for their culture, values, and beliefs.
2. You interact with members of your College Community in an honest and respectful manner.
3. You perform your duties and conduct your relations with students and members of the College Community with fairness and justice. This includes taking appropriate action to ensure the safety and quality of the education and care of students are not compromised because of harmful or prejudicial attitudes about culture, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, age, religion, disability, spirituality, political, social or health status.

4. In planning and providing education and College support services, you uphold the standards of culturally safe and competent care. This includes according due respect and consideration to the cultural knowledge, values, beliefs, personal wishes and decisions of each member of the College Community. You acknowledge the changing nature of families and recognise that families can be constituted in a variety of ways.
5. You do not express racist, sexist, homophobic, ageist and other prejudicial and discriminatory attitudes and behaviours toward any member of the College Community. You take appropriate action when observing any such prejudicial and discriminatory attitudes and behaviours.
6. In making professional judgements in relation to the interests and rights of a member of the College Community, you do not contravene the law or breach the human rights of any person.

Example breaches include, but are not limited to:

Specific Behaviours - Staff

- A staff member not reporting an incident because it could affect the College's reputation.
- A staff member not ensuring required curriculum is covered and within the stipulations of the teachings of the Catholic Church (e.g. Required to teach about contraception in Health but the stance of the Catholic Church also needs to be made clear on this topic).

Specific Behaviours - Students

- A student drinking alcohol or smoking cigarettes at College functions.
- A student expressing opinions in public (including online) that damage the reputation of the College and/or Church.

Specific Behaviours - Parents

- A parent not ensuring their child adheres to the College Uniform Policy.
- A parent engaging in aggressive or abusive language or harassment that can reflect adversely on the College.
