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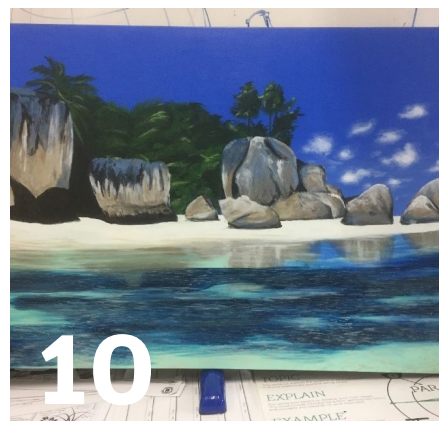
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From the Principal

Extra - Curricular Opportunities

It's important to acknowledge the enthusiasm and commitment of the students involved in all these extra-curricular activities and the dedication of a large number of staff, without whom these activities could not take place.

Student Reports

Year 10 Course Selections

Examination results and Semester One grades are particularly important to our Year 10 students, as they prepare to select their Pathway and courses for their Senior School studies in 2020. Meeting prerequisite requirements for individual courses is important in order for students to maximise their chances of achieving success in their chosen Pathway. Likewise, achievement of OLNA benchmarks will influence the respective Pathways students may consider. Choosing suitable courses is an important process for students as they progress from Year 10 into their final two years of schooling at the College, preparing students for opportunities at University, TAFE, in apprenticeships or the workforce.

The Course Selection process commenced earlier this term when Year 10 students attended the Careers and Industry Awareness Day. Following from this opportunity, a Year 10 Parent Information Evening is scheduled for Tuesday 30 July. It is important that at least one parent/carer attends this Information Evening with their child, as information about the WACE, course selection processes and Pathways will be explained on this evening. Course Counselling interviews for individual students and their families will then follow in early August (specific details will be provided at the Information Evening). Throughout the process, the College will work closely with students and their families to ensure that students are on an appropriate Pathway to enable achievement and success.

Emmaus Retreats 2019

The Emmaus Retreat is a time where the entire College Community stops to reflect on the role Jesus plays in their life. These retreats will occur in Week 1 next term, 24-26 July 2019. The College pauses and enters a time of discernment in unity centred around the Emmaus Story from the gospel of Luke, where two Disciples of Jesus are walking the path to Emmaus. As contemporary Christians, the story helps us see that we too are walking a path in life surrounded by friends and companions. Just as the Disciples did, we too need to genuinely notice those around us and see the face of Jesus in those we meet. The Retreat program aims to allow staff and students to stop, reflect and discern the differing ways in which they encounter Jesus every day, be in it their peers, family, friends or others in their community.

The Emmaus Retreat is a community approach to retreat. The Emmaus Retreat program is built around the Emmaus Story from Luke's Gospel, and guides students and staff to focus on the story of Jesus and therefore the principles of Catholic Social teachings. The Emmaus Retreats are structured to build on Gospel values and Catholic Social Teachings throughout the students' journey over 6 years. Our Emmaus Retreats begin with a focus on Participation and Solidarity in Year 7, and works towards Community and the Dignity of the Human Person in Year 8. In Year 9 and Year 11 we focus on The Common Good and Preferential Option for the Poor, with a culmination of all principles presented in a 3-day retreat for Year 12s.

The Emmaus Retreat involves all students and all teaching staff. The Emmaus Retreats are sequenced to build understanding, knowledge and action in the areas of Christ-Centred Leadership and how to live out the Catholic Social teachings of Community, Solidarity, Human Dignity and Preferential Option for the Poor.

The Year 7 Emmaus Retreat Program is lead in large and small groups by our Year 11 students. The program develops the idea of Community, Identity and the importance of prayer. We unpack the story of the Good Samaritan and focus on the importance of kindness, community and human dignity.

The Year 8 Emmaus Retreat Program is lead by the Middle School Ministry Team who lead students on the journey of discovering Jesus. They focus on the mystery of Jesus in an attempt to demystify the role Jesus plays for them.

The Year 9 Emmaus Retreat is a program of self-discovery. Our students are broken into smaller groups where they are working with staff and Catholic Mission on the value of service to others. We aim to show students that through service to others we learn about ourselves, solidarity and community. This Retreat involves the production of our Lumen Christi College Care Bears, which are distributed to many community members who need prayers and a symbol of community love. We also produce Warrior Mail, which are letters and gifts that are sent to the sick children of Perth.

The Year 10 Emmaus Program is focused on Christ Centred Leadership. Lead by the Youth Ministry Team Perth, this program aims to prepare our students for the journey to young adulthood. The two days focus on Integrity, role models in Leadership and Jesus as our Leader.

The Year 11 Emmaus Program is centred around the example of Jesus as Servant leader. The Year 11 students spend one day in the community assisting our community family in the aim to learn, love and grow in service. The second day is spent leading our Year 7s through their Retreat journey, building relationships, trust and genuine Christian leadership.

The Year 12 Emmaus Program is a three-day, two night, off site Retreat where our 12s are given the opportunity to reflect on the people around them and the path they are on. We divide our students into small Retreat groups, having numerous Retreat sites around Perth. It is their opportunity to encounter Jesus as adults and realise the role he plays in their life. Our staff play an integral role in leading our Year 12 Emmaus Retreats, role modelling their witness and their commitment to their faith.

All of these happen in unison.

We are all looking forward to our Emmaus Retreats in Week 1 next term!

All six students agreed that it was a memorable experience filled with laughter, eye-opening ideas and a greater understanding of ourselves. Engineering Studies

This year we have two Year 10 classes who have been busy with two design tasks as well as various theory topics. The first being to design and fabricate a wheeled vehicle from recycled materials which can carry an egg safely down a rollercoaster ramp. The emphasis being to investigate aspects which would protect the egg in transit and provide the most momentum. Some very interesting and well thought out solutions were produced, with varying success and a bit of fun testing them.

Secondly, students designed and fabricated model cars propelled by CO₂ canisters. With research on aspects of Aerodynamics and Fluid dynamics, students shaped their Co₂ vehicles in order to create minimal resistance and the fastest time on the track. Once again students were rewarded for their efforts, achieving some very good results both on the special fishing line track and the simple wind tunnel attached to the

workshop extraction system.

Currently students are utilising the Metal Lathe and other equipment in the Metal workshops to fabricate a small Air Engine controlled by compressed air. As well as practical workshop experience students can explore aspects of air/steam engines, pressure, force and transfer of motion amongst others.

The Year 12 Engineering ATAR students are attempting to complete the production of an Electric Vehicle in which they can compete in the EV Challenge in November. In between studying aspects of Materials, Dynamics and Statics, students have followed an Engineering design process to manufacture and assemble components of the vehicle.

Year 10 Career and Industry Awareness Seminar

As part of our career development program at Lumen Christi, Year 10 students recently participated in our annual Career and Industry Awareness Seminar. The day was an opportunity for students to consider their options for the future in the lead-up to their Senior School subject selections in Term 3.

The day involved a variety of guest speakers, including Steve Doubell from the Construction Training Fund. Mr Doubell spoke of the vast array of job opportunities available in the building and construction industry. He predicted the next big thing to be renewable or 'green' energy, and suggested students consider other areas which may be in demand in future. He concluded by emphasising that building and construction was not just for males and encouraged the female students in the room to consider the multitude of opportunities within the industry.

Di Watts from the Fremantle Education Centre spoke about the array of VET at TAFE courses they had on offer to our students in Year 11 and 12, as well as the varied career paths these courses might open up to students. These included areas in Community Services, Education

Support and Business. This was followed by a glimpse into life as a paramedic when Wayne from PTI Emergency Services spoke to students.

After the first break, where students enjoyed morning tea, we welcomed back five Lumen Alumni; three from the class of 2013, one from 2014 and one from 2015. The unique and rich experiences each of our past graduates shared, proved that the path you set out on at graduation may not be long travelled before your sights change. The key messages from all speakers was to make the most of your time in high school, start researching future pathways early, but also be flexible and take up as many opportunities along the way as possible.

After lunch, University representatives from Murdoch, ECU, UWA and Notre Dame provided an insight into university life and guided students through the different courses and entry requirements for their respective institutions. Students gained an understanding of how university differed from high school, including examples of timetables and information on the variety of student support services and social clubs. A talk from South Metro TAFE



immediately followed, which certainly highlighted to students how many options await them after Year 12.

Students who might fancy taking a gap year before embarking on further study or training were interested to hear from our final guest speaker of the day. A young lady named Nicola, on behalf of Latitude Global Volunteering, shared her experiences of living in Canada for 8 months volunteering as an outdoor activities instructor. This amazing experience has led to Nicola starting an education degree working with primary aged children.

Maths News

Year 7 Moderation Task

During Week 3 next term, all Year 7 mathematics students will be taking part in a Mathematics moderation process, in conjunction with the School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA). The purpose of the moderation process is to work with schools and teachers to develop a comprehensive and shared understanding of the Year 7 achievement standards. Teachers will develop an understanding of the benefits and use of marking keys as diagnostic tools and in making valid, reliable and consistent judgements on student achievement. The deep analysis of the standards, along with engagement with the assessment pointers, will also support teachers to collect evidence in order make judgements for reporting purposes. The curriculum content which is being assessed and moderated is:

Measurement and Geometry

- Describe translations, reflections in an axis and rotations of multiples of 90 degrees on the Cartesian plane using coordinates.
- Identify line and rotational symmetries

The moderation task will be administered during Mathematics class time during Week 3, by your child's Mathematics teacher.

Taking part in this moderation process will be valuable for both teachers and students, providing a clear link to the achievement standards for Year 7.

The Australian Mathematics Competition will be held at Lumen Christi College on Thursday, 1 August 2019. Students in

Years 7-12 who have been selected to take part are from the following classes:

- Year 7 High Achievement in Mathematics
- Year 8 Advanced Mathematics
- Year 9 Advanced Mathematics
- Year 10 Advanced Mathematics
- Year 11 Mathematics Methods
- Year 12 Mathematics Methods

The Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) was introduced in Australia in 1978 as the first Australia-wide mathematics competition for students. It has become the largest single event on the Australian education calendar, allowing students to attempt the same tasks on the same day in over 30 countries around the globe.

Running since 1978, the AMC is for students of all standards. Students are asked to solve 30 problems in 75 minutes. The problems are designed to test mathematical thinking rather than focus on calculations themselves, thus such questions are designed so that they can be answered just as quickly without a calculator as with one. The problems get more difficult through the competition, so that at the end they are challenging to the most gifted students. Students of all standards will make progress through the problems, and be challenged along the way.

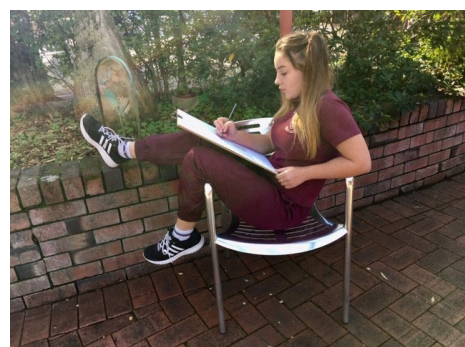

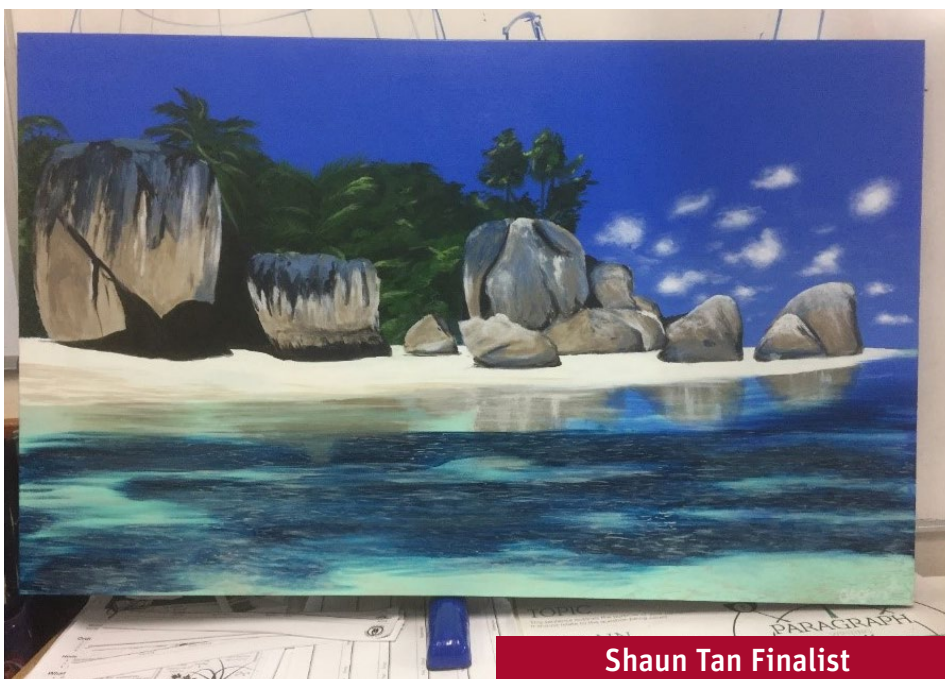

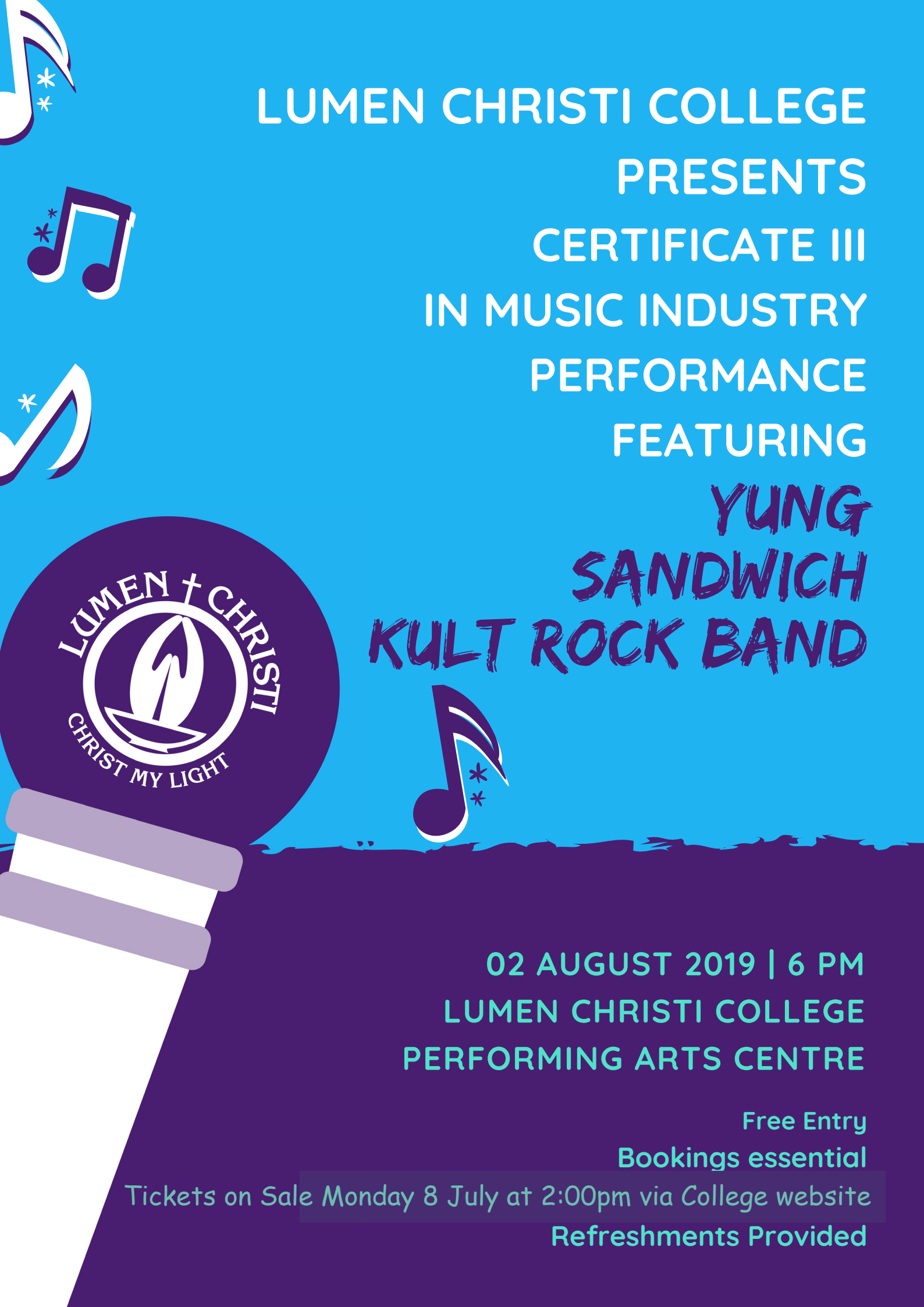
